THE 2010 BIG DAY REPORT

It is our distinct pleasure to present to the ABA Membership the 2010 Big Day Report. From the outside looking in, the pursuit of the Big Day record for a particular state, province, county or whatever that target is, must appear odd. I'm sure the novice would be quick to discount the effort as a bizarre or even as an egotistical endeavor. In today's economy, one might even say it was darn foolish. And, what's the point? Indeed, for some, it's a mark for the belt. But, the pursuit can be more than just that. A lot of information can be gathered and disseminated about bird population status and distribution when coupled with your local listserv or on a wider scale, with something like eBird. In today's e-society, the information on sightings is being shared and distributed at such an accelerated rate as compared to a decade ago, and what better way to survey your local bird populations than through a Big Day?

The pursuit is also an excellent way to hone your birding skills at all levels. Birders of all skill levels who participate in Big Days are analyzing habitat, finding the best travel routes to uncharted birding locations, learning how weather conditions affect migratory patterns, and anticipating the best time birds are moving through their areas. Big Day'ers will find themselves increase their own skills of auditory recognition and field mark identification whether they realize it or not. Non-participants may be reluctant to join in the fray but the information gained from such an experience is invaluable and encouraged. Big Days do make you a better birder as you find yourself not only interested in chasing down life birds, but you will spend more effort improving skills in locating and identifying all species, even the most common of birds.

So, if you have ever considered attempting a Big Day but figured 'what the heck, I'd never break that record', we encourage you to consider it. Sure, not everyone should expect to topple the 200 mark but the comradery and learning experience is well worth the try. Peruse the provincial and state records on page 20 and 21 of this report and check your local area and see what your targets are and give it go!

RECOGNITION

First off, we would like to thank Larry Semo for his years of dedicated service to the Big Day and List Report. Larry has provided us with many insightful words over the years and has encouraged us all to appreciate the birds we see every day and the 'rarities' we chase. We wish you well, Larry.

Larry threw down the gauntlet last year for Big Day'ers to fill those gaps in the record books and it appears that several folks took on that challenge. Thanks to Jean-Sebastian Guenette for taking the time to submit records for multiple Big Days in New Brunswick and Quebec and to Kurt Pohlman for submitting our last open record for Hawaii.

Finally, congratulations to Tom Hince and Paul Pratt who topped their Alberta, Canada provincial record with 213 species and the second highest record for all of Canada! Fellow Canadians Russell Cannings, Chris Charlesworth, Avery Bartels, and Ilya Povalyaev bested the provincial record with 197 species that had been in place for 15 years! The team of Nick Bonomo, Patrick Dugan, Frank Gallo, Dave Tripp, and Fran Zygmunt made two attempts to break the Big Day record in Connecticut, coming in second and third for that state's record of 186 species.

Housekeeping

Per ABA Big Day rules, certain information is necessary of Big Day submissions for acceptance and publishing. Please remember to completely fill out each Big Day form, including mileage, starting and ending times, locations visited, and importance codes for species of note. Incomplete, inaccurate information or failure to comply with the 95% rule may result in the decision to not recognize the record.

Explanation of Terms

Species of Note: A Species of Note is either one that you didn't expect to get but did, or one that you counted on but failed to see.

In the former category are birds you considered you had virtually no chance of seeing during your Big Day. A **Vagrant (V)** is any species which occurs less than annually in the state, province, or country of your Big Day; a **Rare (R)** species is less than annual along your chosen route, but may be more common elsewhere in your state, province, or country; an **Early (E)** or **Late (L)** species is one that is Rare due to being unusually tardy or early. An (S) in the accounts indicates that the rarity or vagrant had been **Staked Out** prior to the Big Day. A (#) indicates an unusually high number of any particular species.

In the latter category are birds that you consider virtually guaranteed, such that you did not specifically plan for them on your Big Day. These are Code 2 birds (no one should ever miss a Code 1 bird). More quantitatively, a **Big Miss (M)** is a species you had a 95% or better chance of seeing along your route at that time of year (i.e., you expect to see the species on at least 19 attempts out of 20), but which you inexplicably missed.

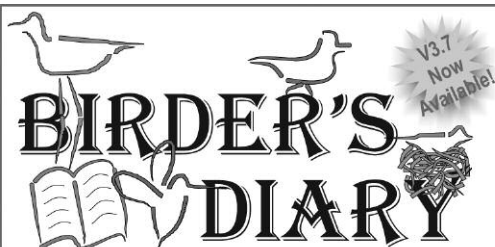

ALBERTA #1 – 2 Jun 10 – 0000 to 2200 – Species totals: 213/208. (Team/shared). Tom Hince (211), Paul Pratt (210). Kilometers by Car: 1130 km. Kilometers by Foot: 1 km. *Visiting:* Primrose Lake Road, Cold Lake, Jesse Lake, Keehewin Lake, Gooseberry Lake PP, Lake Newell, Waterton NP. Species Of Note: Greater White-fronted Goose (L), Ross's Goose (L), Spruce Grouse (R), Black-Bellied Plover (M), Stilt Sandpiper (M), Sabine's Gull (R), Belted Kingfisher (M), Yellow-Bellied Flycatcher (R), Dusky Flycatcher (M), Varied Thrush (M), Bullock's Oriole.

Comments: This big day represents a new provincial record for Alberta and the second highest big day total ever recorded in Canada.

After the incredible success of 2009, we decided to attempt another big day in Alberta. Again we focused our efforts on a midnight to mid morning run through the Cold Lake area, but this time tried to finish in the mountains instead of the Cypress Hills. We spent several days scouting out the mountain portion of the route and felt comfortable that the birds were all in place there.

In the Cold Lake area, scouting was tougher as we encountered several days of cold, rain and wet snow! We had a great time with our friends in the Beaver River Naturalists club and pitched in again to their annual spring count (a great event!). The weather was good for grounding Arctic bound migrants like Sabine's Gull, Parasitic Jaeger and Pacific Loon, but what we really wanted was a sunny late spring day with all the breeders singing their hearts out!

Eventually the weather cleared, and most of the snow melted, and June 2nd looked like the best possibility for our attempt. Last year we had easily found both Yellow and Virginia Rails while scouting and on the big day. This year, despite a much greater effort, we couldn't find either. Fortunately singletons of each had been found on the spring count just two days prior.

Midnight always seems to set the tone for big days and this one was no different. Due to distance, we decided to pass on the Virginia spot and take a shot at the Yellow Rail. Unfortunately our directions were somewhat vague, so we were really not confident we were even in the right spot. We pulled over in the darkness at what seemed like the best spot with a few minutes to the starting line. Yes! There in the distance was a yellow rail clicking away. Just after the tick of twelve it gave one more round of ticks and then shut up. Other birds here included the ever present Sora, plus both Le Conte's and Nelson's Sparrows and Common Nighthawk.

From here we drove directly north to Primrose Lake Road where we spent the rest of the darkness searching for night birds. We managed to eke out Great Horned, Banded and Northern Saw-whet Owls, Pied-billed Grebe and American Bittern, plus the always surprising chorus of Connecticut Warblers. Again much to our amazement we tallied Lapland Longspur as a nocturnal tick! By 3:50 am we had tallied 44 species, which put us roughly on a par with last year.

Somehow, we had convinced ourselves that it would be warmer this year (ha!). At midnight the thermometer was a balmy 46 F but by 4 am we were shivering as we neared 30 degrees. Tim Hortons beckoned but we had birds to find. The dawn chorus was lively but in the cold temperatures rather short lived. However by hitting a number of sites in rapid succession, we were able to knock off almost all the expected boreal breeders.

Despite being a cold spring, all the later migrants were still in place, though in small numbers. Warblers were particularly good as we added at least three Nashville, two Palm, several Cape May, Chestnut-sided, Blackburnian and a single Bay-breasted. Bonuses included a male Three-toed Woodpecker on territory, a late migrant Greater White-fronted Goose mixed in with a large flock of Canada Geese, and a singing Yellow-bellied Flycatcher!

With all these birds in the bag we knew we were doing really well. However, we had delayed visiting English Bay for water birds in anticipation of fog. We were anxious to see if it had begun to clear yet. As we neared the turnoff a good sized bird was standing on the gravel at the edge of the highway. Both Paul and I yelled "SPRUCE GROUSE!!" at the same time. What a great time to fluke this locally scarce bird.

At English Bay our timing was perfect. The fog was just clearing and we managed to find all the expected species quickly. A nice bonus was a flock of half a dozen Greater Scaup and several Red-breasted Mergansers. Best of all was a single Sabine's Gull flying with Bonaparte's and Franklin's Gulls.

When we left Cold Lake we were slightly ahead of last year's pace. But could we keep it going? The key would be shorebirds. Last year we had tallied 26 species, but this had been a lean year for shorebirds in much of the province due to high water levels. Jessie Lake, our first critical shorebird stop, continued this theme with only a few lingering peeps. Right away we were down two or three species. Unfortunately, this trend would continue.

Keehewin Lake was the next key stop. Targets here included Veery, Great Crested Fly-

catcher, Western Wood-Pewee, Broad-winged Hawk and Turkey Vulture. Now the weather killed us as the wet conditions of the last two days had left the road in to the park an absolute quagmire. By birding by the entrance, we managed to dig out Veery and Western Wood-Pewee, but had to drop several more good possibilities and move on.

The next several hours were spent heading south through farmland and prairie, with several stops to pick up scouted birds like Loggerhead Shrike, Baird's Sparrow and Upland Sandpiper. We got a big pick me up when a farm pond still held a lingering Ross's Goose found earlier.

En route to our badland stop, we made a quick detour to a small park where Brown Thrashers had been hanging around. Not only were the thrashers in their spot, but a pair of Gray Partridge were huddling at the edge of the parking lot! We weren't finding shorebirds but if we could keep up our luck with species like this, breaking the 207 of last year might still be possible.

We arrived at our badland spot a bit behind schedule, but we knew if the birds cooperated here we could catch up a bit of time. Once again this site was outstanding and it quickly produced Ring-necked Pheasant, Yellow-breasted Chat, Lark Sparrow, Say's Phoebe, Rock Wren, Violet-green Swallow and Spotted Towhee. Even better were a calling Prairie Falcon on the nearby cliffs and a male Bullock's Oriole being chased by a male and female Baltimore Oriole! We decided to pass on Golden Eagle and Brewer's Sparrow which both had been scouted here and take our 'winnings' and run.

One of the issues of scouting such a long route as this is it takes a lot of time and effort. During the only day we had to scout the next section of our route, there had been twenty four hours of non-stop torrential rain. So we had nothing scouted here, and we knew it was a big risk. We made the erroneous assumption that things had to be similar to the previous year and they were definitely not! We made several desperate attempts to find shorebirds but realized that the habitat was flooded and where there had been hundreds or thousands of Black-bellied Plovers, Stilt Sandpipers and other shorebirds last year, there were now none. And the night herons, Caspian Terns, Red Knots and other bonus birds were non-existent as well. After almost an hour of birding, we moved on with nothing to show for it.

Although the wind had been taken out of our sails, we knew we had to press on and that we could still have a shot at the record if our mountain sites came through. As we neared the mountains, we came across a brand new construction stoppage that cost us fifteen minutes of critical time. It was intensely frustrating to be stuck in the middle of a farm field looking at the mountains where we needed to be! As we looked towards the mountains, we could feel and see there was weather coming and it wasn't looking good. Our first site came through with Bobolink, Lazuli Bunting, Black-headed Grosbeak and Eurasian Collared Dove - all birds we had dipped on last year. Maybe we could do this!

But as we reached the mountains, the winds reached 40-50 Kilometers an hour, temperatures dropped and the skies darkened. There would be no calm evening chorus on this day! Nonetheless we kept plugging and dug out almost fifteen new birds including Harlequin Duck, Fox Sparrow, American Pipit, American Dipper, Cassin's Finch and Townsend's Warbler. We finally packed it in around 10 pm realizing that even the abundant Varied Thrush wouldn't make a peep in these winds! It was so disappointing to spend the last several hours in areas we knew held all the birds we needed but which we simply couldn't find. Still we enjoyed several glasses of good wine and a late dinner to celebrate a new Alberta big day record, and the second highest big day ever in Canada!

In hindsight, this route clearly has the potential to establish a new big day record for Canada. We had some good luck, and we did record ALL twenty five regularly occurring warblers in the Alberta in one day! Nonetheless, we think with a better shorebird migration and good weather throughout the route, a total of 225-230 species may be reached some day in Alberta.

BRITISH COLUMBIA #1 – 19 May 10 – 0000 to 2345 – Species totals: 197/189 (Team/shared). Russell Cannings (196), Chris Charlesworth (192), Avery Bartels (192), Ilya Povalyaev (192). Kilometers by Car: 810. Kilometer by Foot: 2. *Visiting:* Okanagan Valley, Similkameen Valley, Manning PP, Fraser Valley, Fraser Delta. Species of Note: Tundra Swan(L/S), Canvasback(L/S), White-winged Scoter(M), Long-tailed Duck(L), American White Pelican(L), Marbled Godwit(L), Olive-sided Flycatcher(M), Willow Flycatcher(M), Gray Catbird(M). Items of Special Interest: 197 represents a new BC record (beating the old total by 1!)

Comments: We started off the day in the city of Kelowna, thinking this would be a good dry-run for future record-breaking attempts in BC. The night started off well with Common Poorwill, Northern Saw-wet, Flammulated, Great Horned, and Western Screech-Owls all performing on cue. By dawn, we found ourselves up on the Okanagan Plateau east of Okanagan Falls where despite chilly conditions, the birding was good. Several male Spruce Grouse clapped off in the distance, a Williamson's Sapsucker

drummed, and a Northern Pygmy-Owl came in for a close look. By 730 we had hit the valley bottom and were close to 100 species. Heading south toward Osoyoos we picked up many more Okanagan specialties like Yellow-breasted Chat, Brewer's Sparrow, and Canyon Wren. Unfortunately a long-staying Yellow-billed Loon could not be found, but we were happy to tally late Canvasbacks and a lingering Tundra Swan on Osoyoos Lake. We left the Okanagan just before noon with an impressive 155 species. Things seemed to be going well until we made the fatal mistake of driving 30 min out of our way to try and get a Gray Jay (which we had missed in the morning). This would prove costly later on, but we sped along down to the coast with high-hopes. By the time we hit the coast we had 169 species but we were way behind schedule and it appeared as if the mother of all rainstorms was about to hit. Then we got stuck in road-work delays, and although we never talked about it, we were all thinking the day was over. Luckily however, the rain let up by the time we got into South Surrey. Winds were still strong but we managed to make due, picking up 21 species in 2 hours. Now it was dark and we were still 5 species away from tying the record. We knew there were new birds out there but we had run out of light—time to spotlight! By walking around the Iona SL, managed to spotlight some staked-out Northern Pintail, and lucked upon a small group of peeps close to the dyke, bringing our tally to 194 (2 away!). Next, we found a sleeping pair of Mute Swans under the Westham Island bridge. What to do now? We figured our only hope for 2 or more new species was back south in White Rock where White-winged Scoter, Wood Duck, Mew Gull, and Barred Owl might be possible... but in this wind? We pulled up to Crescent Park at 11 pm and walked straight for the duck pond where miraculously—2 Wood Ducks flushed out of some bushes! We hooted and hooted but could not coax up any owls, so we gave up and started walking back to the car. Then, over the sound of high winds in the cedars, the male Barred Owl responded: "hoo-hoo, hoo-huuuuur!!!" (soon after the female joined in) YEAH! WE DID IT! This was one of the most thrilling moments in my birding career. We birded right to midnight along the waterfront but could not find a single bird let alone one we were missing! Considering our missed birds due to late-arrivals, time-mismanagement, etc., 200 is definitely possible in BC. Maybe 2011!

Comments: Van Truan and I, and his two young sons (not birders), did a Big Day on Saturday, 8 May in Pueblo Co. We wanted to see if we could beat our own Pueblo Co Big Day record of 156 species several years ago. We were successful in finding 167 species of birds in Pueblo Co on Saturday. We didn't see anything really rare, maybe our best birds were Common Loon, Gray Flycatcher, Least Flycatcher, Northern Waterthrush, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, and Pine Grosbeak. We did well with several bird families: 16 species of waterfowl, 11 species of shorebirds, 7 species of owls and nightjars, 7 species of woodpeckers, 13 species of flycatchers, 9 species of warblers, and 9 species of native sparrows.

We started at midnight in the eastern part of the Co, trying to find rails. It was very windy, and we heard one species. Then we headed west to the foothills and mountains to try our luck with owls and nightjars, luckily it wasn't windy, and a few were calling. Sunrise was up at Lake Isabel in the mountains, where it was very cold, the high 20s probably. Then we drove a good mountain road, on the way to Rye and Colorado City, where we picked up most of the mountain birds. Rye and Colorado City added quite a few birds. Then we drove some more dirt roads through the pinyon juniper, and added several more birds. Then to Pueblo, where each stop produced birds we hadn't seen yet. Then off to Huerfano Res in the eastern part of the Co, where several late ducks and more shorebirds were present. We then checked out dirt roads near the Huerfano River, and added a more species. We got back to Pueblo in time to find Chimney Swifts, and a couple staked out birds in Van's backyard. We missed quite a few species, that maybe we should have seen, though we were happy with our results.

There were quite a rare birds found in Pueblo Co on Saturday, during the Pueblo Co Spring Migration Count, though we didn't really see any of them. According to Dave Silverman, the Co wide total for bird species counted in Pueblo Co by all parties on Saturday, May 8, 2010, was a new record of 202 species!!

Items of Special Interest: Sponsored by members of the on-line ListServ, Georgia Birders On-Line, our team raised a grand total of \$1677.59 for the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Wildlife Resources Division, Nongame Conservation Program. Also, we had no unshared species: all 174 species were heard and/or seen by all three team members, which was very surprising.

Comments: At two minutes past midnight, we jumped into our vehicle and quickly made our "escape" from an unseen pack of dogs howling at our heels, but we had our Ross's Goose! And so began the 24-hour birding adventure by our team consisting of Ken Blankenship, Nathan Farnau, and Joel McNeal on 1 May 2010. We had our sights set on a new record for the month of May in Georgia; two previous attempts on the same date tied for the record at 174. All three of us being Big Day first-timers, we had done a good bit of scouting to increase our chances. But we were anxious, to be sure: while the route we designed shaved several hundred miles off the well-worn path taken by the vast majority of Georgia attempts, it also skipped several reliable migratory hotspots, Kennesaw Mtn being most notable among them. Still, we felt confident that

what we might miss in the way of spring neotrops that trend to the western side of the state, we would replace with a few key acers up our sleeve.

Even though a misty morning and a low tide awaiting us on the coast were in the back of our minds, our spirits were high as we ventured forth. We quickly recovered from our canine scare and were very pleased to sweep all the likely owls and two nightjars over the next three hours at various stops in and around the Oconee NF. It is still unclear what genetic mutation Joel "suffers" from, but whatever it is allowed him to detect our only Great Horned Owl, which was calling from so far off that it took me and Nathan (both with excellent birding ears) several attempts before we could make it out. We also had a few pre-dawn passerines, including Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Yellow-breasted Chat, and Indigo Bunting. At 0500 we met with Paul W. Sykes, Jr. (a non-participating companion), who graciously escorted us onto private property where he has permission to bird. In less than 10 minutes we had one of the key species we had come for, as the classic "kee-kee-derr" of a Black Rail was heard faintly but clearly by all team members. Before long, dawn chorus was in full swing and we quickly began racking up locals and migrants. A Northern Bobwhite (easily missed) called from far off, but I could just make it out and alerted Joel and Nathan. We were disappointed not to hear Yellow Warblers singing, as many were there during scouting efforts in the previous week. Nice surprises included a Pectoral Sandpiper hanging out with expected Least Sandpipers in a muddy area, a Sora that flushed underfoot, a few pseudo-late Swamp Sparrows, and a fly-over by an adult Bald Eagle.

We bid Paul goodbye and next visited a staked-out site that has hosted several breeding pairs of Swainson's Warblers for many years. However, on this particular morning they were mum, and thus became the first of several painful misses. As a pseudo-consolation, we picked up other bottomland species here including Acadian Flycatcher, Prothonotary Warbler, and Hooded Warbler. It was on to the State Botanical Garden, our primary migratory passerine stop for the morning. We did pretty well, nabbing several key species that are much easier at spots on the popular I-75 route: Swainson's Thrush, Veery, Blackburnian Warbler, Bay-breasted Warbler, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, and Baltimore Oriole. Still, Joel noticed a marked decrease in species diversity from just the previous morning, and with the overcast and misty conditions, fewer birds were singing. A quick stop at Lake Herick was rewarding, as we instantly located a rare Lincoln's Sparrow that had been found by a friend earlier in the week, and was still hanging around in the same spot. At both of these sites we tried for White-breasted Nuthatch and struck out, and this became a Big Day lesson: do not take a common species for granted at another stop. We knew the species was out of the picture once we hit the coastal plain, but could not imagine that it would end up among our misses before leaving the piedmont. It was 0953 and we had accumulated 113 species so far, though we didn't know it at the time (more on this later).

From the woods it was on to open pastures and farms in the countryside south of Athens. A great species for a Big Day in our state, a Dickcissel was proudly teed up singing on a fencepost, while a rolling flock of 100s of Bobolinks made a nice backdrop. We drove through a sod farm and were happy to quickly locate our two targets, Loggerhead Shrike and Horned Lark. But the next stop was anything but satisfying. A Snow Goose had taken up residence at a farm pond, not unlike our midnight Ross's Goose, and was right next to the road less than 24 hours previous. But on this day, that blue phase bird was nowhere to be found, though we wasted precious time combing the surrounding pastures and ponds looking for it. Naturally, it was back in the same spot just days later! Already a bit later than our targeted departure window, it was time to make the long haul to the coast, as all Georgia Big Day attempts must eventually do. We left the piedmont behind at 1105 with a respectable 118 species. We picked up a few road birds on the way south, including a Cliff Swallow colony on a bridge and a fly-over Mississippi Kite that jolted Nathan and Joel awake, as this frantic driver suddenly pulled over so all could hop out and get their binoculars on the bird.

We knew the tide was not in our favor, but were nonetheless dumbfounded at the number of species we could not locate during our critical beach observations at Gould's Inlet on St. Simons Island at 1616. We found only seven shorebird species, missing several that we hoped to be there, such as Piping Plover, American Oystercatcher, Red Knot, and Western Sandpiper. But the reason was simple: it was dead-low tide (expansive sandbars extended far out into the Atlantic) and the birds were just spread out all over. We were happy to find five tern species, and to have gotten our coastal birding underway after our long southward slog. We next headed over to Jekyll Island, where a quick scan of the marsh thankfully added a few more shorebirds and Gull-billed Tern. At a small wading bird rookery, we gladly found both night-herons and 14 gorgeous Roseate Spoonbills, a species which has yet to be documented nesting in the state (though breeding seems imminent). We were also ecstatic to hear a Yellow Warbler belting out his happy tune; scarce on the coast in spring, we had written it off much earlier in the day. We wrapped up at the expansive freshwater marshes better known as the Altamaha WMA. There we added important species that we knew we could find nowhere else on our route, including Black-bellied

Whistling-Duck, Mottled Duck, Least Bittern, Purple Gallinule (almost missed it hidden in the reeds), and Black-necked Stilt. Walking along the dikes of the property was brutal, though. Fatigue had more than set in, and we were now being bombarded by an infestation of huge biting deer flies and mosquitoes. Though we stayed until it got dark trying in vain for another rail species or a nighthawk fly-over, we decided to call it quits early so that we might get to a nearby restaurant before it closed, and before we passed out from blood loss or succumbed to delirium. It was 2116, and we had how many species?

And this was when our rookie team learned perhaps the most valuable lesson of all: keep track of your running total as you go. Was it negligence? Maybe a bit of over-confidence? Whatever it was, though we had kept a paper checklist and a meticulous digital voice recording of species, mileages, and times, we had not done an overall count at any point during the day! We ordered some food and some cold brews, and started counting. Nathan first came up with 166. Disgraceful! We sulked. Then he realized he had skipped an entire section of the taxonomic list, not a surprise considering how frazzled we were. On the second try, he came up with 174: only one species short of a new record! Joel recounted twice, and finally I gave it a go. It was worse: 173, not even a tie. But wait, what time was it? We quickly downed our late dinner, probably the only thing that kept us on our feet for the last couple hours, and bolted back to the Altamaha. We listened intently for a nighthawk, but with a steady breeze now blowing in our ears, it just wasn't happening. But low and behold, a King Rail reluctantly belted out his "gruh, gruh, gruh" call after a half-hour stakeout on the observation tower. We had tied the record. We spent what little time remained searching in vain for that nighthawk out to I-95 to scan the billboards, in downtown Darien and Brunswick where they might nest on a rooftop, but it just didn't pan out. By 2359 we had accumulated (for the third time in history) a total of 174 species recorded in Georgia on 1 May. The two previous attempts were made by some of the state's most accomplished and skilled birders, and we all felt very proud to be in such good company! With many big and small lessons learned along the way, we are already planning next year's assault.

Comments: The October 14, 2010 big day was a great success, Brian Bockhahn, Ali Iyob and I recorded a record number of 141 species of bird despite very fast wind speeds preventing us from finding many land birds and making listening extremely difficult.

We started at Mattamuskeet, where we got the owls, a mother and cub bear running down the middle of the road that we nearly ran over, but had trouble hearing nocturnal migrants because of the high winds—the first good bird was a King Rail before dawn on Wildlife Drive. After dawn, we had a woodcock, Winter Wren, etc. We drove up to the causeway, where we found very large numbers of ducks on the east side of the causeway. The flocks included most species of dabbling duck as well as a Redhead and flyover loon. After a few stops, we hit pay dirt with some very good migrant flocks on the more northerly part of the causeway. Included in these flocks were Yellow, Black-throated Blue, Palm, Yellow-rumped, Pine, Blackpoll warblers, parula and yellowthroat, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, some cuckoos, Baltimore Oriole, and more. On the far north side of the causeway, at and just past the last clump of trees on the east side, we found a very productive spot. Here we had flybys of numerous ducks, some gulls, Forster's and Caspian terns, a Snow Goose in a flock of Canadas, a flock of Cattle Egrets, calling Sora, Merlin, snipe, Dunlin, and a Blue Grosbeak that flushed out of the grass with a HENSLOW'S SPARROW!! The Henslow's was flushed from the marsh grasses on the east side about 100 yards past the last easterly tree—it was quite good at hiding low in the grasses, but gave a couple looks in the open, and some decent flight looks.

We then hit Wildlife Drive again, where we found another decent flock of land birds that included Magnolia Warbler, Gnatcatcher, cuckoos, etc, as well as some water birds like moorhen and Marsh Wren. We also nailed most of the remaining hawks here and a random soaring Anhinga! We got some of our only woodland birds here too including titmouse, Hairy Woodpecker, sapsucker, Summer Tanager, etc. Lake Landing was pretty much bare, the wind very bad here. We had some trouble with the agriculture fields with the wind, but managed a pipit amongst other things.

Our drive to the coast was unsuccessful, but a backyard on Roanoke Island had a couple birds we had missed before, such as towhee, House Finch and Ruby-throated Hummingbird. We finally got our first robin around 3 o'clock on Roanoke as well!!

We stopped by a little stretch of beach by the new pier they're building near Whalebone Junction that had an Avocet, some Marbled Godwits, Sanderling, Ruddy Turnstone, Willet, Black-bellied Plover and more—not a bad flock!! Bodie Island lighthouse boardwalk had a number of rails, including Virginias, a nice Sedge Wren, Little Blue Heron, and a Red-breasted Nuthatch calling from the pines north of the lighthouse.

Our next stop, Oregon Inlet Jetty was very successful, with Sandwich Tern, Lesser Black-backed Gull, and lots of new shorebirds including multiple Piping Plover, Red Knot, Oystercatcher, Western and Semipalmated Sandpipers, and more, as well as an American Redstart on the ground by the old coast guard station.

Our drive to the Pea Island visitor center got us a White-rumped Sandpiper in the ditch across the road from North Pond. Pea Island did not produce the White-cheeked Pintail for us (we the only ones not to see it that looked?) but we managed to find a couple of new birds, including Gadwall, Mute Swan, and a nice Vesper Sparrow right under the west tower. Not much else was found after that, except 2 very close encounters with radio-collared bears at Alligator River.

Misses were very bad because of weather, and they included such embarrassing birds as: Downy and Pileated Woodpeckers, American Goldfinch, House, Field, and Savannah sparrows, White-breasted Nuthatch, any vireo species and any flycatcher species besides phoebe, Cedar Waxwing, Black-and-White Warbler, and more. We also seemed unable to find any staked out birds, such as Clay-colored and Lark Sparrows, and, of course, the White-cheeked Pintail, which, we learned after, was seen earlier in the day.

But the total was 23.5 hours of fun, 141 species of birds, lots of food, lots of mammals including 6 bears and howling Red Wolves, and more. Special Thanks to all that donated money for the big day to go towards my eagle project!

OHIO #1 – 15 May 10 – 0000 to 2100 – Species totals: 180/179. Paul Chad (180). Matt Kemp (179), Greg Links (180). Miles by Car: 43. Miles by Foot: 3. Shared Total: 179. *Visiting:* Oak Openings region, Mallard Club Marsh SWA, Pipe Creek SWA, Pickerel Creek SWA, Magee Marsh SWA, Ottawa NWR, Metzger Marsh SWA. Species of Note: King Rail (R), Common Loon (L), Up; and Sandpiper (R), Marbled Godwit (R), Blue-headed Vireo (R), Brown Creeper (R), Louisiana Waterthrush (R), Henslow's Sparrow (R), Blue Grosbeak (R) all of the above were stake-outs(S).

Comments: Matt Kemp picks me (Paul Chad) up at my apartment at 23:00 and drives us to Mallard Club Marsh. Greg Links is there at the parking lot, and we get underway! Out on the dikes at Mallard, I looked at my cell phone to get the correct time. 00:00 midnight - A King Rail continues to call, and a Least Bittern also makes a call or two. Greg's hand-clap got a Sora and then a Virginia Rail to respond almost immediately. In the still conditions, the Trumpeter Swans sound as if they could be heard for miles. Marsh Wren and a few other birds are heard. We were out of Mallard Club at about 00:10 - geez, what a GREAT start. Then a quick stop at a spot at the end of Cedar PT Rd - a Screech Owl immediately responds to Greg's imitation - an interesting spot in daylight - anything else here? nope.

On the observation deck at Krause Rd /Stange Rd, and vocals from Black-crowned Night-heron and our only Greater Yellowlegs of the day. At the Magee causeway, Greg and Matt pick a Sedge Wren out amongst all the Marsh Wren vocals (geez! good work, guys) - and off in the distance, Green Heron! AND Great-Horned Owl! two 'missable' NCO birds (G-H Owl nest was found during scouting, but nestlings had left) Working west, back at Metzger Marsh, picked up Moorhen.

We worked some parking lots for Common Nighthawk along SR 2 in Oregon - no luck. On into Toledo - the Mudhen stadium was lit! Would this give us an easy nighthawk? For a moment, Greg and Matt hear what might be a nighthawk sound over all the background noise, but later would decide they couldn't be sure - and looking over at the Commodore Perry building, no Peregrine showed in our spotlight. On to University of Toledo bell-tower, and - Peregrines on the wing, circling the bell-tower, in the DARK.

On through west Toledo, heading to the 'west side', the Oak Openings area - it is about 02:20 now. We swing by the edge of Secor Metropark /Irwin Prairie for nighthawk (later, even over to Anthony Wayne HS and a quarry pond in Whitehouse, but no nighthawk). At Girdham Rd /Reed Rd, Barred Owl responded, and eventually a distant Whip-poor-will is also heard - also heard a 'bit' of a Yellow-billed Cuckoo 'song' near here, and even got a Lark Sparrow to sing! (was in its traditional spot) We spot-lighted Cooper's and Red-shouldered Hawk nests - a clear look at the Cooper's nest but NO bird, and NOT a clear look at the R-S nest. These birds will have to wait until daylight. Further songbirds, such as Mockingbird, were heard - about 05:00, and our 'pre-dawn' list had reached about 32 species.

Dawn at Sager Rd / Wilkins Rd - Ring-necked Pheasant, Henslow's Sparrow, and Grasshopper Sparrow are all heard promptly, as Matt had predicted. More, along Sager Rd - Yellow-breasted Chat, and a few other good birds such as singing Mourning Warbler and Lincoln's Sparrow are checked off. Now, on to - what shall I call it? - Matt's amazing "Tour of the Oak Openings Area for Rare and/or Specialty Breeders of NW Ohio" ...! knocking off birds such as Blue-headed Vireo, Brown Creeper, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Louisiana Waterthrush, Blue Grosbeak, and Summer Tanager, in what seemed no time at all - VERY impressive! along with some of the less uncommon birds in the area such as Hooded, Pine, and Blue-winged Warblers, Orchard Oriole, and also at least one Vesper Sparrow.

White-eyed Vireo, and even Cedar Waxwing, were scarce, but we got them. A return to the Red-Shouldered Hawk nest was successful. Kingfisher (Swan Creek) was added - nice, ANOTHER potential NCO 'nemesis' bird out of the way! A House Finch or two are found (a common bird but not easy on an NCO run), and our only Carolina Wren of the day is heard at one point.

Greg's Barred Owl imitations at several spots failed to get a response from Pileated Woodpecker, but at one spot brought in a pair of the owls themselves and whipped them into quite a frenzy! Missing Pileated was a bit disappointing, although Greg's imitations probably helped get a Hairy Woodpecker or two that Matt was able to pick out of the responding woodland birds and get us on to. Also, Cerulean was absent near

Mallard Lake after 6 straight days earlier for Matt - a Yellow-throated Warbler at Secor for three days earlier in the week may have moved on - oh well, probably unrealistic that ALL Matt's birds would show... (but we can always HOPE)

Last stop was getting the Common Loon at Salisbury quarry pond. Onto the Ohio Turnpike at about 09:10 - six shorebirds so far, and Connecticut topped the list of 24 warblers - about 125 species at this point, and many 'quality' species at that, Greg notes - many easy species left 'on the table' - and thoughts of a record day began to creep into the discussion...

Off the turnpike near Sandusky - a few common species are added en route, but a Cooper's was on the wrong side of the vehicle for Matt. The significance of this is that: NCO rules differ from ABA Big Day rules in that, for NCO, all team members must get ALL species on the list. (also, no audio playback of vocalizations allowed for NCO) The 'Sandusky Cattle Egrets' were off their usual locale a bit, but Greg knew right where to find them! Into Pipe Creek with 130 species. On the bikes and on the dikes (rhymes!). Just about the first duck we come across takes wing - a Lesser Scaup! Northern Shoveler, Hooded Merganser, and Northern Pintail are all eventually spotted in the impoundments, and Ruddy Ducks and a very distant Red-breasted Merganser out in the Bay.

Common 'east side' species like Double-crested Cormorant, Great Egret, and American Coot begin to get 'cleaned up'. Then back to the car and then the little woods-edge, for land-bird migrants - Palm, Cape May, Wilson's, and Bay-breasted Warblers, White-throated Sparrow, and Gray-cheeked Thrush, are all nice to get out of the way ahead of the Magee boardwalk! 24 species added at Pipe Creek brings the total up to 154, at about 11:50, with Pickerel /Resthaven, Ottawa NWR, Metzger (again), and Magee Marsh ahead - and our record run picks up steam!

Bayview /Medusa Marsh are passed up. Bobolink, Bald Eagle, and Common Tern are added around Willow PT - and shorebirds are found here and there in flooded fields - Black-bellied Plover, Semi-palmated Plover, Lesser Yellowlegs, Short-billed Dowitcher... Greg picks out a Ruddy Turnstone in a Dunlin flock that Matt and he help get me on after the birds take flight. At one spot, Matt hears an American Pipit as our vehicle approaches one of the puddles - we pull off to a good spot to scan, and Greg picks this small brown bird out of the field stubble in the distance with the scope - good job, both you guys!

We then work the impoundments at Pickerel Creek, and hit our only real slow-down of the day - in about 1.5 hours, Matt, and then Greg a bit later, turn up Black Duck(s) - but Redhead, Bufflehead, Green-Winged Teal (many), American Wigeon, and even a Eurasian Wigeon(!), all scouted within two days earlier, ALL fail to put in an appearance for our team today - aaarrgh! Among hundreds of gulls and dozens of Caspian Terns on one of the dikes, Matt locates a Forster's Tern. Any sign of the Franklin's Gull that Greg found on Thursday in the area? no luck on that one. Our 'countdown' to the record-breaker had began a bit ago and had slowed down, but now stood at 9 at about 14:10.

The Osprey is immediately found on the traditional nest at Resthaven SWA - OK - That's more like it! Now, back toward Magee et al via SR 2. A stop at the overpass at La Carpe Creek, and Cliff Swallows are there as per Greg's scouting - now seven. 15:00 - On to the Ottawa NWR 'Auto Tour' of the closed part of the refuge - wow! First ever opportunity to do this for the NCO. But - this year there are no drained impoundments for shorebirds, and the other impoundments hold no visible ducks or any other types of 'bonus' birds - in short, a 45-minute flop! but - a Bank Swallow or two fly by and vocalize, and I join Greg and Matt for this species. AND - right at the end of the tour, a distant American Bittern's repeating 'oonk-a-choonk' is heard - now five.

After a bit of searching along Krause /Stange for recently-reported Upland Sandpiper, Marbled Godwit, and (a female) Yellow-headed Blackbird, we decide to move on to Metzger, where Black Tern is soon located out over the water - now four! Now, back to Krause /Stange and two Upland's have attracted quite a crowd - and US as well! now THREE. It is about 16:50 as we head into the famous Magee Marsh. A stop at the hummingbird feeder at the Visitor's Center mid-way in soon has a Ruby-throated appear - now TWO... On to the 'East Beach', where Matt expects us to find Ruby-crowned Kinglet - and it is just about the first bird we find - tying the previous NCO record of 173, now ONE to break it.

Onto the boardwalk, and - a Prothonotary Warbler puts us over the top! Now, just a matter of what the final number will be... Looking for birds like Philadelphia Vireo, Orange-crowned Warbler, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher, etc. - about another hour is spent here on the boardwalk, and one more bird is eventually added - a stunning Golden-winged Warbler! 175.

Back out to the deck at Krause /Stange for a scan for the godwit. ...at last, Matt says "Got it!" - and Greg and I look in the scope - Matt SOMEHOW found the godwit practically concealed in a tall grass section of the field to the south - great work! I soon afterward get Greg on a (also, concealed) bird in the scope that looks like Pectoral Sandpiper - Greg is beginning to agree when a different bird takes flight and calls - Pectoral Sandpiper! 177.

On to Krause Rd to try to find the female Y-H Blackbird - we work the fields hard but

no luck. In the sky to the north, I see some very distant raptors and I call over to Matt to get him on the smaller one - what was it? Would it be the Cooper's that Matt needed? Greg gets on the bird and shouts out "Harrier!" - and indeed it was! even came past us later for a closer look. Back to Magee Marsh causeway, hoping for a nighthawk, just maybe an Alder Flycatcher, or how about the Cooper's Matt still needed? A very distant nighthawk is found flying around to the north and gets us to 179. A quick peek and listen along the old driveway at Ottawa, but 180 would stay just out of reach, and we headed over to Blackberry Corners at the finish (21:00) with our new NCO record total of 179. (and count the Cooper's Hawk, for ABA Big Day total of 180)

Some summary: Our list had a few good birds but featured NO real rarities - very unusual if not unprecedented. Also unprecedented; our team got ALL the night-birds. The weather was slightly colder than normal, but was practically perfect otherwise, making for great locating /observing conditions.

Species of Note: Northern Harrier (L), Northern Goshawk (L), Western Sandpiper (E), Black Tern (E), Brown Pelican (M,S), American Kestrel (M), Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (M,S), Acadian Flycatcher (M,S), White-eyed Vireo (M), Yellow Warbler (M,S), Blackpoll Warbler (M,S), Black-and-white Warbler (M,S), Summer Tanager (M,S)

Comments: We got started a little late and did not have time to check the Blue Ridge Parkway Pioneer Farm for woodcocks. Our first stop was in Augusta Co. to check for Barn Owls, which circled over our heads. We stopped at several locations on Route 642 in Highland Co. for owls, especially Northern Saw-whet Owl. At around dawn we were in Highland Co on Alleghany Road headed to Locust Springs, however there was a tree down across the road, and it cost us nearly an hour detouring around it. This delay necessitated skipping a couple locations, costing us several species. We left Highland Co. with nearly 100 species heading toward the eastern shore. We lost so time in traffic on the Hampton Road Bridge, and missing our exit for the CBBT. I want to thank Mrs. Newberry, for being the designated driver. I also want to thank all the VA-birders who responded to my species requests.

WASHINGTON #1 – 15 May 10 – 0000 to 2400 – Species totals: 197/192 (Team/shared). Ryan Merrill (194), Ryan Shaw (194), Michael Woodruff (192), Charlie Wright (197). Miles by Car: 700, Miles by Foot: 2.

Visiting: White Pass area, Tieton River, Toppenish NWR, Status Pass, Lyle/Balch area, Ridgefield NWR, Rainbow Falls SP, Willapa Bay, Tokeland, Westport. Species of Note: Common Merganser (M), Pacific Golden-Plover (R,S), Glaucous Gull (R), Caspian Tern (M), Western Screech-Owl (M), Accipiters (M), Swainson's Thrush (M), Bushtit (M), Say's Phoebe (M). Items of Special Interest: This was a completely new route for any attempted Washington Big Day. With better scouting in the future, the WA Big Day record should be quite beatable.

Comments: (account by Charlie Wright). On Friday night, May 14, Michael Woodruff, Ryan Shaw, Ryan Merrill, and I set out from Tacoma to test a brand new and ambitious Big Day route for Washington State. We had very little idea of what to expect as none of us is intimately familiar with much of the route and we did exactly zero scouting!

The route: Owling from Rimrock Lake to Bear Canyon starting at midnight, then dawn chorus at White Pass, Rimrock Lake, Tieton River. Then we blasted to Toppenish NWR, birded along 97 going south in the cottonwoods/riparian, Satus Pass, and Brooks Memorial Park. Then through Goldendale to the Lyle-Balch Lake area. We then left the eastside and headed for Ridgefield NWR. From there, we went up I-5 to Chehalis and Hwy 6, with a quick stop at Rainbow Falls SP. Then it was on to Raymond, Tokeland, Grayland, and finally as light disappeared, Westport. We owled again in the Westport area, finally ending at Johns River WR at midnight, which made for a very full day.

To begin, we started owling up Tieton Res Road. We heard a Long-eared Owl at the

marsh near Tieton Airport. Great Horned Owls were calling at several places, and we finally heard one extremely distant Flammulated Owl a ways up Bethel Ridge Road. We tried Bear Canyon for poorwills, but there was very localized strong wind here, so no luck. At dawn we arrived at White Pass, where we heard Gray Jay, Townsend's Solitaire, Varied & Hermit Thrush, and Townsend's Warbler. The shores of Rimrock Lake gave us Williamson's Sapsucker, Northern Pygmy-Owl, Red Crossbill, and Sooty Grouse. A return visit to the airport marsh was a great idea, as it was loaded with Sora, two Barrow's Goldeneye, our only Cedar Waxwing of the day (they seem on the late side this year) and in a small grove of Ponderosas a pair of White-headed Woodpeckers! Back out on the highway, Shaw's able eyes spotted two pairs of Harlequin Ducks and Woodruff got us on a dipper, all in the Tieton. Bear Canyon had a few warblers and Western Wood-Pewee.

After a very quick stop at Andy Stepniewski's house for Black-chinned Hummer (thanks Andy!) we then drove to Toppenish NWR, arriving at 8am. First checked Zimmerman's where we had our only Virginia Rail for the day. I also saw a Sage Thrasher (clearly an out of place bird here) along one of the entrance roads; unfortunately it evaded us after my initial view. Other birds on the refuge included Ring-necked Pheasant, Black-necked Stilt, American White Pelican, Long-billed Dowitcher, Wilson's Phalarope, Loggerhead Shrike, Long-billed Curlew. A few miles south of the refuge we had Golden Eagle, Grasshopper, Sage & Vesper Sparrows and Gray Partridge.

We had Yellow-breasted Chat and Lazuli Bunting singing in a nice strip of cottonwoods east of 97. Satus Pass was very slow as the temperature had risen considerably. Brooks Memorial Park produced Calliope Hummingbird and our only Downy Woodpecker of the day. Driving through the Columbia Hills we picked up Rock Wren, Lesser Goldfinch, and Swainson's Hawk. In the cliffs east of Lyle we had Canyon Wren, Prairie Falcon and several White-throated Swifts - the latter possibly uncommon in Klickitat Co? We then drove to Balch Lake Road area. Ash-throated Flycatcher was found calling around here. We succeeded in very quickly finding two Acorn Woodpeckers at the traditional granary tree, with Wild Turkey calling at the same spot.

It was then westward to Ridgefield, crossing over to the Oregon side from Hood River to Bridge of the Gods to save a bit of time. We briefly paused at Skamania Landing Park where there was a Western Kingbird, uncommon in Skamania. At Ridgefield we did the auto tour route at River 'S.' American Bittern was heard all over Rest Lake. On the loop we picked up Blue-winged Teal, Lesser Scaup, Common Goldeneye, and Redhead. Our next stop was Rainbow Falls SP, where we quickly picked up two male Hermit Warblers and Olive-sided and Pacific-slope Flycatchers.

As we rushed out to the coast, we knew it would be hectic trying to get everything we needed on the saltwater before usable light faded. But we didn't quite realize how productive the birding would be! We made a quick stop at the Raymond STP where there was a pure white immature Glaucous Gull. Willapa Bay had huge numbers (3000-4000) of Brant. We checked the pastures just south of the Tokeland turn-off and quickly found the 4 Pacific Golden-Plovers (2 male, 2 female) found here by Tom Aversa a few days ago. Also a Greater White-fronted Goose with Canadas in the same field. At Graveyard Spit we scoped Red Knots, Short-billed Dowitcher, and a Red-necked Phalarope. At the marina we found Greater Scaup, White-winged Scoter, Marbled Godwit, and Purple Martins. Next, at Grayland Beach (Cranberry Beach Road), we scanned offshore and found several thousand Sooty Shearwaters, some Brown Pelicans, Bonaparte's Gulls, Black-legged Kittiwakes, Red-throated and Pacific Loons, Common Murres, Rhinoceros Auklet, and various others. Racing the sun to Westport, we picked up Brandt's and Pelagic Cormorants and Wandering Tattler on the jetty. After it got dark, we listened for shorebirds migrating. That's how we finally got Greater Yellowlegs and Least Sandpiper. We made an owling attempt around Westport, but all we could find was a Barn Owl at Johns River before midnight.

Final tally, 197 species! We drove 755 miles in 24 hours of birding. We look forward to revisiting this route in the future, next time WITH scouting.

Big Misses - and they were BIG: Tundra Swan (staked out at Ridgefield), Cackling Goose (same as swan), Ruddy Duck, Common & Hooded Merganser, Caspian Tern (should have been common on C. River and coast - ???), Semipalmated Plover, Western Screech-Owl, any Accipiter, Red-breasted Sapsucker, Mountain Bluebird, Swainson's Thrush, Pygmy Nuthatch, Hutton's Vireo, Bushtit, Say's Phoebe, Gray Flycatcher, Golden-crowned, Fox & Lincoln's Sparrows.

NICARAGUA — 9 May 2010 — 0530 to 1730 – Species totals: 71/71; (Team/Shared). Rob Batchelder (71). –Non-participating Companions: Larry Drazba, Steven Fondriest, Lili Nigaglioni. Miles by Car: 150. Miles by Foot: 2. Other Miles: 3 by boat. *Visiting:* Estero Real (Chinandega), Managua.

Comments: While not a “serious” Big Day, I took advantage of a visit to CAMAN-ICA’s impressive shrimp farms in Nicaragua’s Estero Real to attempt to break the standing ABA Big Day record of only 56 species. Our host, Larry Drazba, arranged a tour of

the farm’s expansive shrimp ponds, along with a boat tour along one of the bird-rich tributaries of the Estero, and a short walk through second growth Pacific tropical dry forest on a finca adjacent to the farm. Although most winter visitors and passage migrants had already headed north, the sheer numbers of resident herons, egrets, storks, and terns was impressive. Ruddy-breasted Seedeater was the day’s only lifer for me, but we saw large numbers of them in grassy fields at a neighboring cattle farm. The dense woodland behind the farm held a female Rose-throated Becard tending a nest, along with a variety of species common in Pacific-slope deciduous lowland forest. The mangroves of the Estero failed to produce several lifers I had hoped for such as Boat-billed Heron, Mangrove Cuckoo, and Mangrove Vireo, but I was content to finally catch up with the resident “Mangrove” form of Yellow Warbler. A very vocal and conspicuous Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl was a nice surprise, as were a “Mangrove” Black-Hawk and Zone-tailed Hawk flying over the shrimp ponds. While nearly all of the day’s species were tallied prior to our afternoon drive back to Managua, after dropping off my non-birding companions, I rounded out the Big Day list by adding Red-billed Pigeon and Grayish Saltator from my bedroom window just before dusk.

With a little more effort, planning, and visits to some additional habitat types, a single-day tally of more than 100 species ought to be quite achievable in Nicaragua.

It is our pleasure to present to the ABA membership the annual ABA List Report. This report is a culmination of the arduous birding accomplishments achieved by ABA members during 2010. As with most things in life, there are no guarantees, but time invested in birding usually has its reward in seeing a new bird species or, at the very least, a species not seen in some time. The goal of some may be to 'win', while others only strive to have an enjoyable day of birding. But there are no prizes for success and the rules are only policed by the honor system. The true "prize" is the personal satisfaction of experiencing an enjoyable time with friends and/or family in the field doing something we all enjoy, birding. The ABA supports competitive birding by encouraging members to submit the numbers of species they have observed in their lifetime, during the past year, in one day, for various regions, etc. and publishes birders' proud achievements annually.

As you make your way to your destinations, I am sure you will come across a birder or two that are not members of the ABA. We encourage you to share with these people your excitement of the sport and what it means to be a member of the American Birding Association. It is only with your continued support that ABA can survive in today's ever evolving world. AOU NORTH and SOUTH

The 2011 ABA List Report will feature a new category, AOU-South. The addition of the AOU-South listing region coincides with the AOU's South American Classification Committee. The geographical region of this new listing area is as described by the committee: (1) continental South America and all islands within 1200 km of its shores eastward into the Atlantic and westward into the Pacific oceans (including Malpelo, the Galapagos islands, San Felix and San Ambrosio, the Juan Fernandez islands, Fernando de Noronha, Trindade, Martin Vaz, São Pedro and São Paulo Archipelago, and the Falklands/Malvinas); (2) islands in the Caribbean Sea close to South America and not covered by the AOU Checklist (including Netherlands Antilles, Trinidad and Tobago); and (3) waters within 200 nautical miles of the coasts of these land areas, including the islands.

The AOU-North category will continue as previously defined by the ABA Recording Standards and

Ethics Committee: This includes North and Central America from the North Pole to the boundary of Panama and Colombia, including the adjacent islands under the jurisdiction of the included nations; the Hawaiian Islands; Clipperton Island; Bermuda; the West Indies, including the Bahama Islands, the Greater Antilles, Leeward and Windward Islands in the Lesser Antilles (ending with Grenada); and Swan, Providencia, and San Andres Islands in the Gulf of Mexico. Members are encouraged to revisit the definitions of all the listing regions and categories on pages 63 and 64 of this publication and submit their lists accordingly.

DEADLINE CHANGE

After some debate, it has been decided that the deadline for submission to the Big Day and List report needs to be extended to the end of February from the existing end of January deadline. This extension will allow time for the staff at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology to update the Clements Checklist and make any necessary changes and/or corrections to the list. This will give ABA members some breathing room so there is time to obtain those updates and verify their numbers are correctly updated before submission to the ABA List Report. The deadline for submission for the 2011 Big Day and List Report is 29 February, 2012.

ONLINE SUBMISSIONS

ABA members are strongly encouraged to submit their list totals to the 2011 ABA Big Day and List Report through our online forms. The ABA Big Day form is available year-round and is safe and easy to use. The 2011 ABA List Report form will be available by December 1, 2011 and will remain online until March 1, 2012. The information is gathered in a secure database that is then used to create the reports. In this 2010 ABA List Report, over half, or 500+ submissions were received in hard copy format, which then has to be manually input into the database which the online form populates. The use of these online forms greatly decreases the opportunity for errors and lets you, the member, input your own data into our system. These forms can be found on the ABA website at www.aba.org/bigday.
